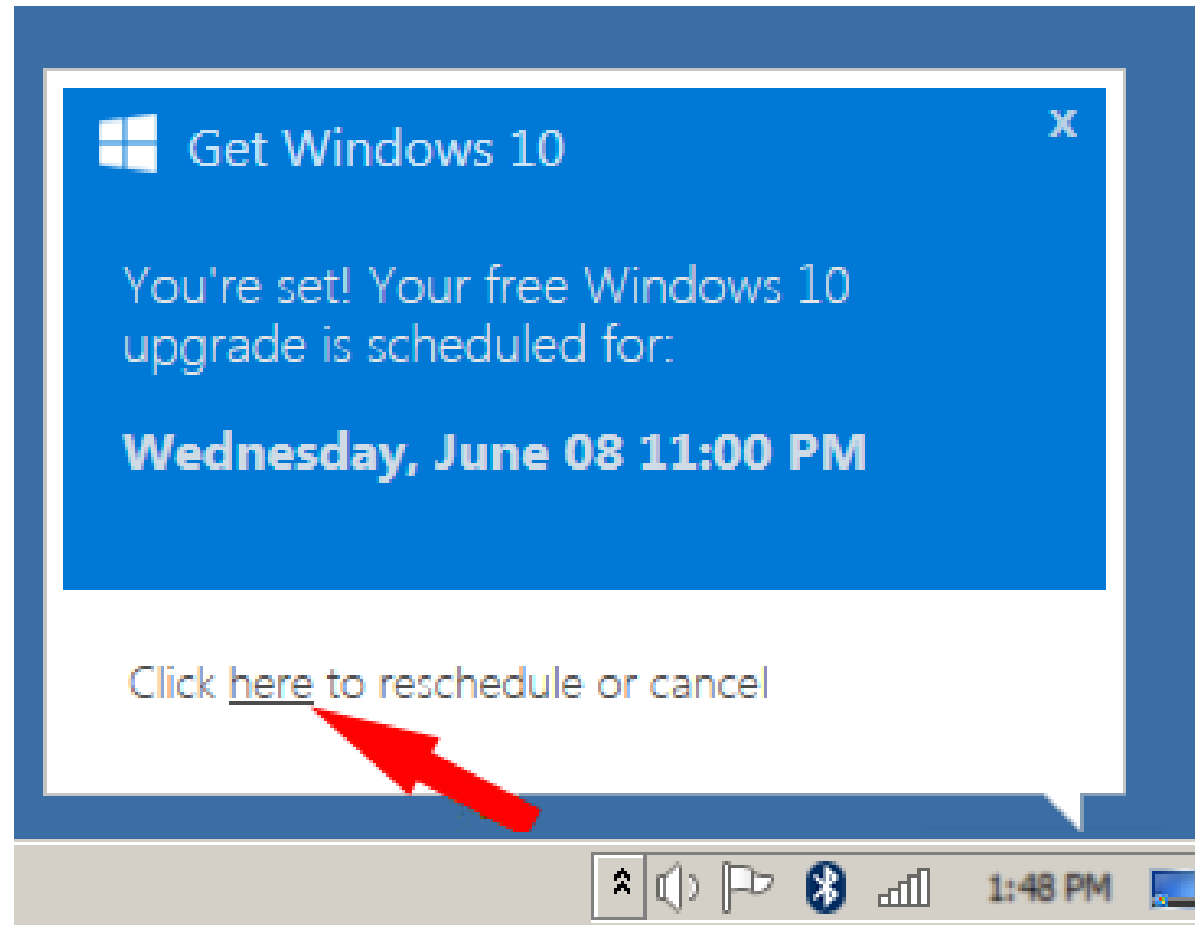


# **Avoiding the automatic Windows 10 Upgrade**

- The upgrade is free now, but this is a limited-time offer



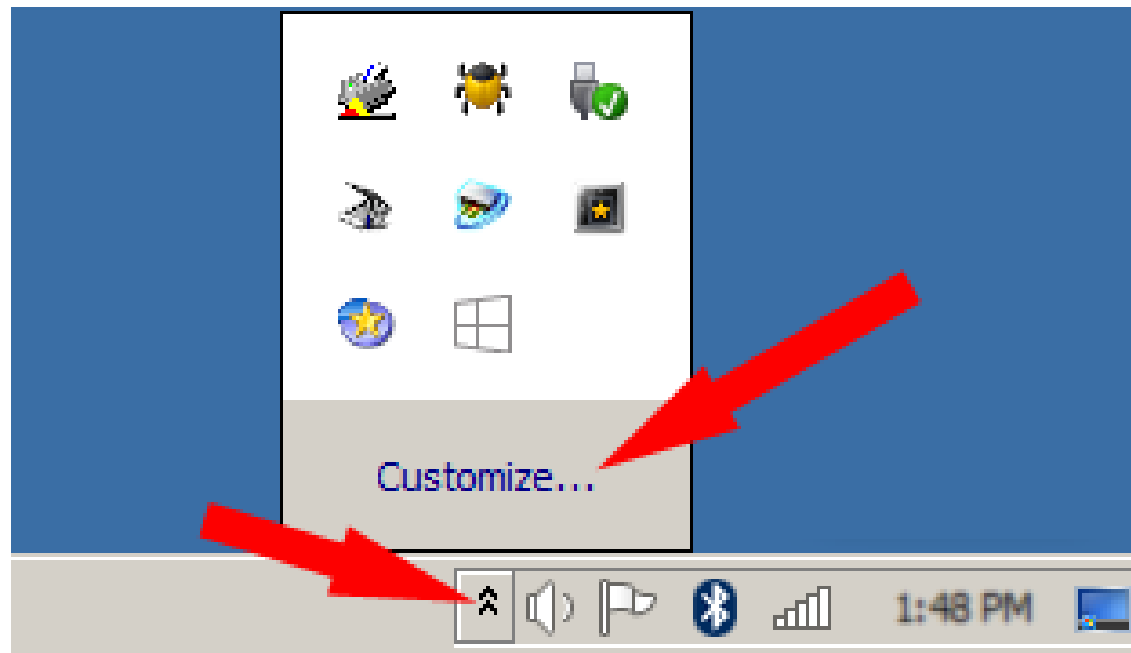

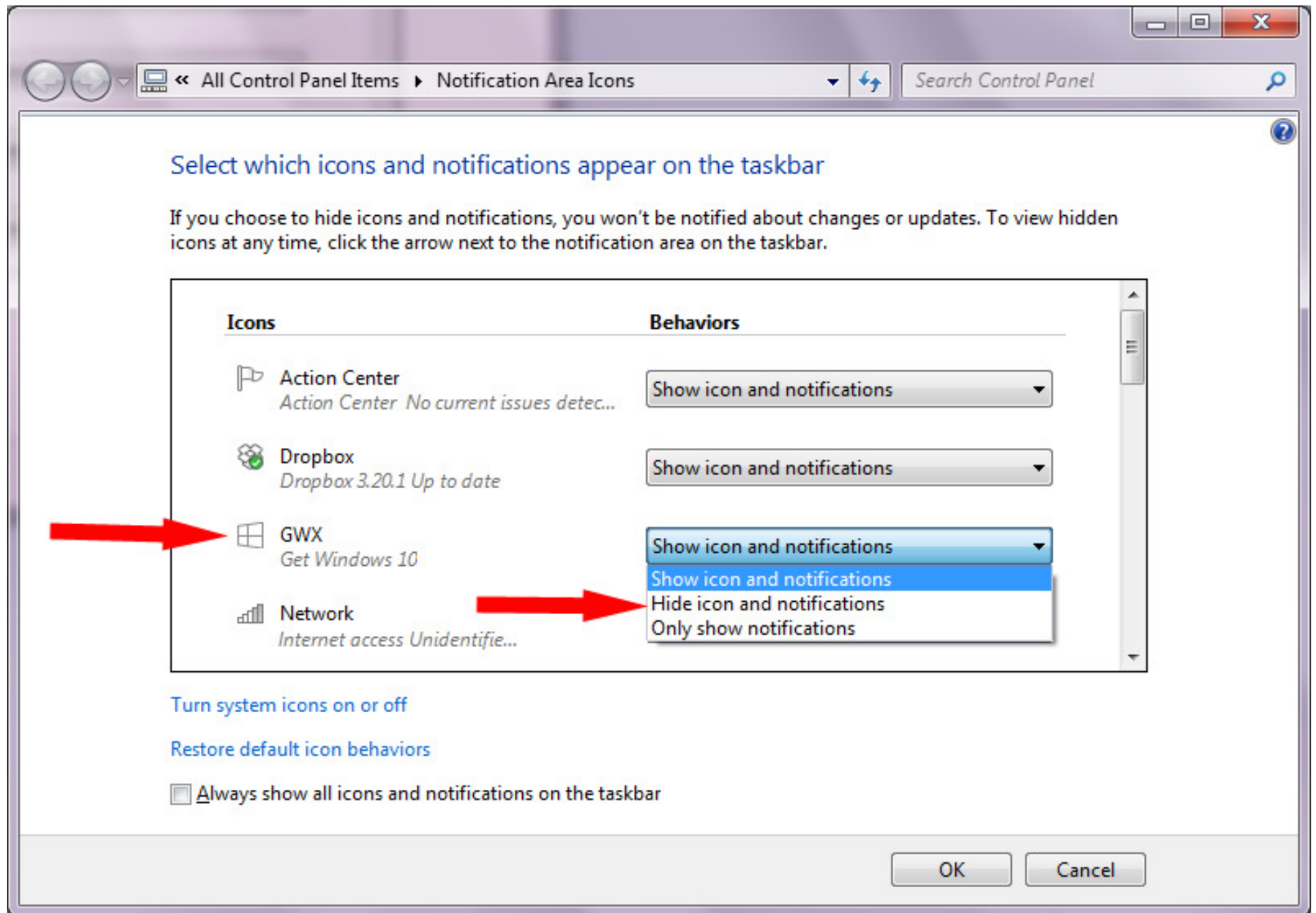

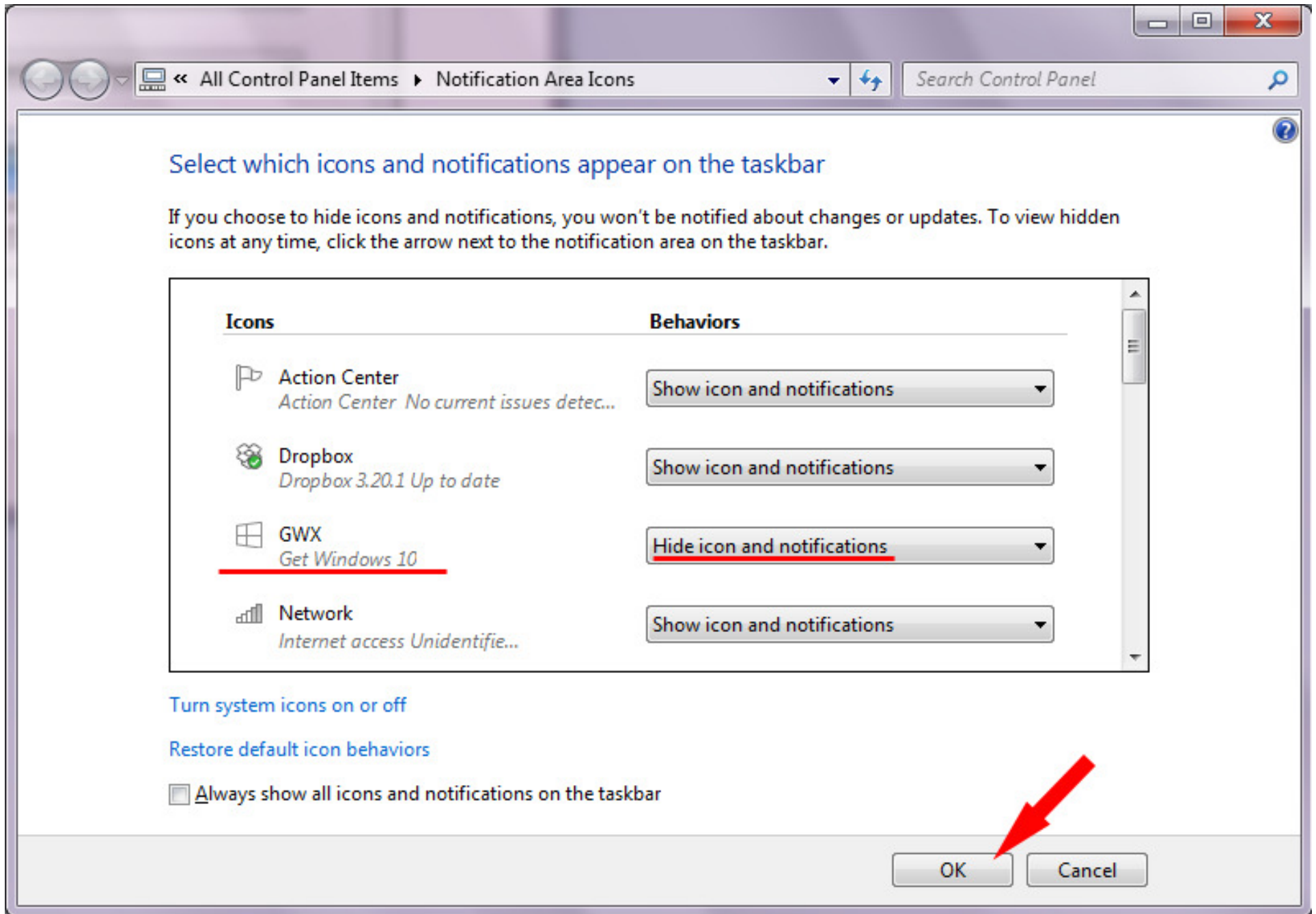
